Content

The course aims to develop the student's knowledge of different traditions within textile design through studying dominant international and specific local geographical perspectives. The course also aims to develop the student's ability to describe and critically discuss their own and others' design work based on various perspectives within the field of textile design. The main content of the course is as follows:

- Introduction to textile science concepts
- Presentation and discussion of traditions and contemporary concepts based on international and specific geographical perspectives within textile design
- Form and concept studies through representations and reconstructions
- Interpretation exercises and formation of the student's own design work with reference to contemporary experimental and professional practitioners and forms of presentation

Learning Outcomes

After completing the course, students should be able to:

- 1. demonstrate basic knowledge and understanding of the dominant international and specific geographical textile traditions based on theoretical, artistic and practice-based perspectives,
- 2. analyse their own work and that of others based on a specific perspective within textile design through their own design work,
- 3. position and reflect on their own design work in relation to experimental and professional design practice and its social implications.

Forms of Teaching

Tuition consists of lectures, seminars and supervision.

The language of instruction is English.
