Content

The course aims to deepen students' understanding of systematic design work. The course also aims to apply methodical principles and foundations in practical design work, in order to further develop the ability to shape the design process. The main content of the course is as follows:

- Reflected experimental design work.
- Different working methods within textile and fashion design.

Learning Outcomes

On completion of the course, students will be able to:

- identify and explain basic concepts that are used to build given general models and methods,
- identify and describe central choice points where analysis is used in design (synthesis) in typical design process samples,
- develop and reflect on the design process in a systematic manner with regard to experimental work.

Forms of Teaching

The teaching takes the form of presentations followed by seminar discussions and supervision.

The language of instruction is English.

Forms of Examination

The course will be examined through the following examination elements:

- Seminar presentations (Learning outcomes 3) 2.0 credits Grading scale: Fail (U)/Pass (G)
- Project work (Learning outcomes 3) 3.5 credits Grading scale: Fail (U)/Pass (G)
- Written reflection (Learning outcomes 1-3) 2.0 credits Grading scale: Fail (U)/Pass (G)
