Content

This is a self-study course, which means that each student chooses a subject to study. The supervisor and the student decide upon material to be analysed, on method and on planning of time. Each part of the course is to be documented. The course contains the following parts:

- subject specification
- raw report seminar
- halfway seminar
- final seminar

Learning Outcomes

The objective of the course is providing the student with the opportunity to freely study a specific subject that interests them. From a theoretical or practical perspective, the individual student is to work with problemising the chosen area, thereby deepening and widening his/her previous knowledge in business administration.

Upon completion of the course, the student is expected to demonstrate

- skills and abilities in planning, carrying out and presenting work
- abilities in identifying and phrasing a problem
- skills and abilities in creating a frame of reference
- skills and abilities in choosing scientific method
- abilities in analysing material in the chosen field and draw conclusions

Forms of Teaching

Tuition is conducted through seminars and via individual supervision. Tuition is in English and so is the literature.

Forms of Examination

The course is examined through a written report. In order to obtain the final grade "Passed" for the course, the student must pass the report and in order to obtain the final grade "Passed with distinction" the student must pass the report with distinction. Student rights and obligations at examination are according to guidelines and rules for the University College of Borås.

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Literature and Other Teaching Materials

Literature is chosen in consultation with the supervisor.

Student Influence and Evaluation

Student influence is based on a dialogue and a close cooperation between students and the teacher. It is carried out by the student being given the opportunity to evaluate the course contents and the way it is carried out, his/her own performance and the performance of participating teachers. The evaluation will be compiled and made public in accordance with the School's regulations and will be the foundation for future course planning.

Miscellaneous

The course is for international students. The course replaces Individual studies in Business Administration, SFEX10.
