### Content

The course aims to explore the methods and mediums of contemporary art and to relate them to design methodology when it comes to fashion design. This is mainly done through design exercises that are based on artistic methods. The course's main content is:

- Theory and methodology in contemporary art
- Perspectives on the role of the body in the historical development of contemporary art
- Forming of independent investigative design work based on selected methods

## **Learning Outcomes**

After completing and passing the course, students should be able to:

- 1. demonstrate knowledge and understanding of the methods, theory and design of contemporary art,
- 2. identify connections between contemporary art and fashion design,
- 3. identify and reflect on the features and trends of contemporary art,
- 4. apply artistic methods as a starting point for independent design work,
- 5. evaluate and reflect independently on their creative process and artistic development.

### Forms of Teaching

Lectures, literature studies, supervision and seminars

The language of instruction is English.

# Forms of Examination

The course will be examined through the following examination elements:

- Documented independent creative work (Learning outcomes 1, 2, 4, 5) 6 credits Grading scale: Fail (U)/Pass (G)
- Written reflection (Learning outcomes 1, 2, 4, 5) 1,5 credits Grading scale: Fail (U)/Pass (G)
