Content

This course focuses primarily on the social and cultural context of the English language. The status and importance of English as a world language is discussed, both from a contemporary and historical perspective. Knowledge of English's position as a world language is also deepened through the study of fiction from different parts of the English-speaking world, where postcolonial theory is the starting point for analysis and discussion. The different variations in the language are studied based on central sociolinguistic concepts and theories, which also includes immersing oneself in self-chosen areas relevant to the subject.

1.2 explain the position of English as a global communication medium and discuss what consequences this has for linguistic and cultural conditions in Sweden

3.1 discuss the role of language in colonial and postcolonial processes, for example with regard to issues of power and identity

Forms of Teaching

The course teaching consists of:

- lectures
- workshops
- seminars

The language of instruction is English.

The maximum number of examination occasions for each examination component in the course is five. An examination occasion that has been "used" means an examination in which the student has received a grade (Fail/Pass/Pass with distinction).

Grades are based on an overall assessment of the student's knowledge, skills, and ability to make evaluations. Grades are determined by a specially appointed teacher (examiner) (Higher Education Ordinance, Chapter 6, Section 18). The grade of "pass with distinction" for the course can be obtained if the student has received "pass with distinction" on more than 50% of the points that can receive that grade.

If the student has received a decision/recommendation regarding special pedagogical support from the University of Borås due to disability or special needs, the examiner has the right to make accommodations when it comes to examination. The examiner must, based on the objectives of the course syllabus, determine whether the examination can be adapted in accordance with the decision/recommendation.
